

Spring cleaning is more than mopping the floor

After the mid-week service today (26th Feb), where I had preached on "pick up thy cross and follow me", I went home and checked my diary, only to discover that I had a free afternoon and evening.

As I enjoyed my lunch, I began to mull over what I could do with my free time; go to the gym, go for a cycle, read a book, catch up on some TV or something else. As I was mulling over my options a voice in my head said, "pick up thy mop and bucket and wash me". That was it, I was to wash the floor. I duly swept the floor and hoovered it, then I got my mop and bucket out, filled it with floor detergent and hot water. I went to start at the front door area and noticed that it was particularly dirty. A quick mop was not going to clean it properly, so I got a basin of hot water soapy water, got down on my knees and started to scrub the floor. After working my way down the hall, I noticed that the water needed changed, I got up, emptied it out, filled it with fresh soapy water, and got back on my knees. Eventually I had washed all the floor. Why am I telling you this story?

Today is Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Lent is generally a time where we take time to reflect on our lives, and start to clean up anything in our lives, that does not fit in with God's plan. A bit of a holy spring clean you may say. When I was beginning to prepare to clean the hall floor, I noticed that simply using a mop and detergent, was not actually going to remove all the dirt and stains.

As I said earlier, I had to get down on my knees and give it some good old elbow grease and change the water several times as it got dirty rather quickly.

So also, when it comes to having a holy spring clean of our lives, just as a quick prayer doesn't properly clean our hearts from our sins. We need to get on our knees, and give our sins some good old holy elbow grease, some serious prayer.

Once we have properly cleaned the floor, it is a good feeling

to stand back and look at how clean it is.

As we come on bended knee to Jesus, to have a holy spring clean of our heart, Jesus washes and cleans us, and it is a good feeling to know that we are cleansed from our sins. Of course, like a clean floor, it will get dirty again, we will make mistakes and we will need to get on our knees again and come to Jesus once again to be cleansed. Something else I noticed about the floor, the longer you leave it, the dirtier it becomes.

Being cleansed of our sins, is not a one off deep clean, it is not a once a year holy spring clean, it is an ongoing process, of washing and cleansing, washing and cleansing.

As you read this article, why don't you ask the Holy Spirit, to reveal anything in your life, that needs a good clean.

Then get on your knees (if you can) and ask Jesus to give you a good old Holy spring clean.

As for me and the rest of my time off today, well the living room rug is next to be tackled, cleaning seems to be never ending.

Monthly Church Lunch

Please come along and join us at the Church Lunch on the first Sunday of each month after Morning Worship. Everyone is invited and welcome to come and share in this time of fellowship together.

If you joined us at the February Church Lunch, you may have tasted the lovely **Cheese and Spinach Muffins** that were made by one of our Young Church members, Ben (with a bit of help from his parents!).

Below is the recipe that Ben used.

Makes 10 regular-sized or 12 cupcake-sized muffins

oil or butter (preferably unsalted) for frying, plus extra butter for greasing

½ small red onion, finely chopped

175g (6oz) plain flour

1 ½ tsp baking powder

1 tsp cayenne pepper

1 egg

110ml (4fl oz) milk

125g (4 ½ oz) grated cheese

60-75g (2-2 ½ oz) baby spinach leaves, torn (or you can use defrosted frozen chopped spinach)

Preheat the oven to 160°C/325°F/Gas Mark 3. Heat the oil or butter in a frying pan, add the onion and fry until soft, then lift it out using a slotted spoon (to drain off the oil) and set aside.

Sift the flour, baking powder and cayenne pepper into a bowl and make a well in the centre. Beat the egg in a jug or bowl and add the milk, whisking them together, then pour the mixture into the flour and fold together.

Add the cheese, fried onion and spinach, and fold gently until evenly mixed, then spoon the mixture into the muffin tray.

Bake for 15-20 minutes (depending on size), until golden brown and springy, then remove from the oven and allow to cool in the muffin tray for a few minutes before turning out.

Imagine a return to work after an absence. Do you leap out of bed shouting, "Thank God it's Monday", or are you like me: throw the alarm against the wall and plead, "Don't make me go there".

God calls us to be Christ-like 24 hours, 365 days a year (the peach) and not only on a Sunday (a segment of an orange). It can be a tough challenge in today's increasingly politically correct, and often anti-Christian, workplaces, however "the workplace is God's place, and His place is just as much there as in the church prayer-meeting. The workplace is a place of opportunity – a place to express the compassion of the gospel in word and deed, to challenge non-biblical thinking and practice, to grow in faith and character and love.

God at work through us.

God at work in those we work with." (quote from Mark Greene, "thank God it's Monday: ministry in the workplace" p13.)

A couple of years ago I was drawn to a, "Christians in Work" Conference, and have ever since, felt inclined to initiate a **Christian Women at Work group** within Partick South: we meet once a month, on the third Sunday, after church for a couple of hours of lunch and fellowship. The aim is to offer support to women in a range of work situations – there is no fixed definition of work – it could be paid employment, volunteering, maternity leave, stay at home, freelance, or... well anything. In addition, we have a, "What's App" group for ongoing support and prayer requests for situations arising throughout the week.

Paul writes in Colossians, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord you are serving."

Why Keep Lent?

Lent, the forty days before Easter (not counting Sundays), is a somewhat curious period in the Church's calendar. Most things in the Church's year are festivals and we happily talk about celebrating them. Lent is very different: it is a minor-key period which is never 'celebrated' but only 'kept'. Some churches and Christians treat Lent very seriously, while others ignore it entirely.

Even among those who keep Lent, there is no agreement on how it should be kept. Many Christians try to give up something: for instance, chocolate, social media or television. It's even become a period for us to try to break bad habits, almost as if Lent gives us another opportunity to retake those New Year's resolutions!

What exactly is Lent about? Lent is 'preparation'. Lent is about three preparations.

- 1. Lent is a preparation for Easter. Easter, with its message of Christ destroying sin and death through his death and resurrection, is the most exciting moment in the Church's year. Yet we can undercut this note of victory by being so occupied that, amid the frantic busyness of our lives, we carelessly stumble upon Easter. Lent provides us with forty days' build-up to Good Friday and Easter Sunday that forces us to prayerfully ponder the death and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. As the best way to appreciate a sunrise is to be there in the darkness before dawn, so the only way to appreciate Easter is to have come to it through Lent. We as Christians are, of course, an Easter people living in a Good Friday world.
- 2. Lent is a preparation for Existence. A fatal flaw in our culture today is that people do not know how to say 'no' to bad things. It is now almost a virtue to give in to every desire that comes upon us. Yet a great element in Christian morality is to be able to say no to wrong desires. Paul, in Titus chapter 2 verses 11 and 12, says this: 'For the grace of God has appeared that offers salvation to all people.
- It teaches us to say "No" to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives.' Lent gives us the opportunity to practice resisting harmful and hurtful desires that will continue for life. Trivial as it may appear, a battle won over chocolate, coffee or cake at Lent may help us win a battle over lying or laziness shortly afterwards.
- 3. Lent is a preparation for Eternity. If you take Lent seriously, then these forty days can seem to be a long and often wearying season in which we never get our own way. Here, for a time, pleasures are put to one side and joys are postponed. But Lent doesn't last. The darkness is broken by the joyful light of the glorious triumph of Easter Day. Here there is a splendid parallel with our lives. For many of us, much of our life seems to take place in what we might call 'Lent mode': things do not go as we hope, we do not get what we want and our joys are absent or at best short-lived. Yet, for the Christian, there is that wonderful and certain hope that however deep and hard the darkness is in our lives, it will ultimately be lifted and replaced by an indestructible joy. For those who love Christ, life's long Lent will end, one day, in an eternal Easter in which death and sin are destroyed for ever.

Whether or not you keep Lent, which started on Wednesday 26th February – and in what way you keep it – is your choice. But to keep Lent, thoughtfully and prayerfully, is to come into a rich and lasting inheritance. Be blessed this Lent and bless others.
